


CAMPAIGN FINANCE

FEDERAL ELECTION CAMPAIGN ACT 1974


Created Federal Election Commission (FEC)

Administers and monitors campaign laws

Required quarterly reports disclosing how much campaign has raised, who it came from, and how much has been spent

Limited Contributions





Public Financing

FECA (1972/74): Campaign funds provided from \$3 voluntary donations on tax forms

Presidential Candidates:

Can receive federal matching during primary, full funding in general.

In exchange, candidates have to accept spending limits

Hard Money vs. Soft Money

Hard Money:

- Spent Directly on a specific candidate
- Advertising, Bumper Stickers, Mailing, etc.
- "Vote for", "Vote Against", "Nydle for Senate", etc.
- Highly regulated and limited



Soft Money:

- Donated to major parties, distributed for numerous needs
- Meant to be for voter registration and outreach
- Cannot mention specific candidate, or a "vote for/against"
- Unlimited contributions



McCain-Feingold

The Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act of 2002

Banned soft money
Required candidates to "approve" ads with
their names in it

Loophole in the law created 527 groups (After 527 in the IRS tax code)

(Today's SUPER PAC's)
Unlimited contributions
Protected by Freedom of Speech



527 Groups

Independent, Tax Exempt Groups

Issue Advocacy (Soft money)

Not directly tied to ad or party

Cannot say "vote" or "vote for/against"

Usually used for negative ads to attack

Must disclose contributions/expenses





Political Action Committees PACS

Not tax-exempt

Must Register with FEC, Disclose Donors to public

Hard Money: Directly linked to candidates Money/Resources (independent expenditures)

527 groups can also create PACS






Citizens United v. FEC (2010):


corporations have same rights to free political speech as people, including spending

Cannot limit financial contributions toward election activities (as long as not "coordinating with candidate")

Replaced 527's and turned them into SUPERPACS. (Soft money on Steroids)
